

#### **New Online Faculty System training**

**Buildings and Churchyards** 

From late Spring, the Church of England will launch a replacement system for the Online Faculty System, the portal that is used by parishes to apply for Faculty and List B consents. The Church Buildings Team will be due to undertake training on the new system early in the new year; following this they will be releasing training dates and venues (including online) for parish training. Training will be useful for clergy, churchwardens, parish staff, fabric committees and anyone else who is involved in caring for churches and churchyards.

#### Collective Worship – The Heart of the School

Thurs 16 January, 10:00 – 15:30

This course is aimed at headteachers, clergy and Collective Worship leads within a school. Collective Worship should be the beating heart of the school. In this course we will look at ways in which we can see Collective Worship afresh and look at opportunities for ensuring that worship is transported from a 20-minute session to a living expression of the school's distinctively Christian vision, both inside and outside of the school. We will look at ways in which we can take worship beyond the gathered meeting and embed it into all that we do in school life. We will also look at how pupils can have a vital role in ensuring Collective Worship is the heartbeat of the school not only through planning, leading and monitoring but as also being ambassadors for Collective Worship in school and beyond.

Every time we say the creed, we repeat that our faith is "in accordance with the scriptures". When we do so, we are echoing St Paul's words to the Corinthians. Those words were themselves already a tradition passed on by the apostles when Paul received them perhaps three years after the first Easter. "For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures." (1 Cor 15:3-4) The scriptures Paul and the creed are talking about are the ones we now call the Old Testament, and this session is all about how the New Testament writers used the books we now call the Old Testament.

The late New Testament scholar Martin Hengel is reputed to have said: "If all you know is the New Testament, you do not know the New Testament". In this session we'll put Hengel's claim to the test, and do so specifically in terms of how far the NT writers expected their audience to know the Old Testament, and how they appeal to Israel's Scriptures when trying to understand Jesus and his ministry. How do we see Jesus himself appealing to Scripture, and what parts of the OT are particularly significant in this regard?

Dr Dave Allen is Academic Dean and New Testament Tutor at the Queen's Foundation, and is the author of several books on the way the New Testament writers use the Old Testament / Hebrew Bible.

# **Lunchtime Learning— Praying with Classic Prayers**

Many Anglicans used to learn some collects by heart, and as a prayer that used to be prayed every day in Lent, the Collect for Ash Wednesday was one of those most likely to be learnt by heart and widely known. As we prepare for the start of Lent in a fortnight's time, this collect helps us think about how we might pray and see ourselves before God at this time. #### **Keeping our Churches and People Safe**

Wed 26 February, 10:00 - 13:00

From time to time, we hear of a physical attack on a priest, or church member, or read a story about church vandalism. There are also increasing stories of people being verbally abused or harassed, especially online. This workshop is about how we help keep one another, ourselves and our churches as safe and secure as possible. It will also have an opportunity to explore how we deal with hate crime.

It will be run by an expert from the Community Safety Trust (CST). CST is a Jewish community charity that was set up to protect the UK Jewish community from antisemitism and related threats, particularly terrorism. They provide the security at 650 Jewish community buildings and 1,000 Jewish community events every year. They therefore have a lot of expertise which they are now offering to all faith communities. They make no charge for their work, and offer it as a gift to us.

This session will look at threats to Christian communities; legal aspects of security; risk assessment; the physical security of buildings; security procedures; hostile reconnaissance; dealing with suspicious people, vehicles and packages; emergency procedures and more. It will include an overview of Martyn's Law – draft legislation currently making its way through parliament, which will oblige most churches to prepare for the possibility of a terror attack.

Finally, given the present climate online and in the physical world, it will offer an opportunity to look at the poorly understood, but much publicised offence of hate crime: what it is, how to avoid it and how to protect against it.

This event will be particularly valuable for clergy and churchwardens, and is open to all.

# What Do We Do When Church Stops Working? A Day with Andrew Root

Mon 3 March, 10:00 – 16:15

Narratives of church decline, especially the loss of younger generations, are everywhere. But what if our cultural assumptions have informed our view of ministry and church so much we've become blind to what God's doing? What if this 'dying' church is actually where we might find the very ministry of God?

We invite you to a study day with Andrew Root, the Carrie Olson Baalson professor of youth and family ministry at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. Alongside various Youth Ministry publications, Andrew has recently completed a 7 part series, reflecting theologically on topics like evangelism, church decline, secular mysticism and congregations within a secular age.

During the day, Andrew will guide us through secularity in the west and understanding why ministry feels so hard. He will explore the present pace of western life, the 'accelerated age,' and how the church functions within it. He will explore the narratives of church decline, and where we might discover God within it. He will also unpack the particularity of Youth Ministry provision in this age, and how we might move beyond narratives of attrition to a praxis of fruitfulness.

**Engaging the Bible in Ministry**

This is especially for ALMs, but is open to anyone. Those who've recently completed their specialist ALM training as Pastoral Workers or Worship Leaders are particularly encouraged to attend, but anyone who is interested is welcome.

The Bible is a significant resource for ministry, and growing in familiarity with it strengthens our understanding of ministry, our ability to minister, and the ways in which we can be supported and challenged by listening to God.

In this session, we will reflect on overall narrative of the Bible, and some stories of how it came into being. We will conclude by looking at some of the things the scriptures say about ministry.

The Church of England shares two main creeds with the wider Christian Church. The Apostles' Creed is the basic creed of our common baptism. The Nicene Creed comes out of the resolution of a major disagreement in the early church and has become the fullest shared statement of faith we use regularly at the Eucharist.

These creeds together form the bedrock of our understanding of the Christian faith, and the framework within which we carry out our Christian life, witness and ministry. In this session, we will reflect on how we got the creeds, explore why the Church continues to think doctrine matters, and finish by looking at how the doctrine of God as Holy Trinity and Jesus as fully God and fully human inform our ministry in God's name.
